Basic Internet Research Tips:

- 1) Start general, then narrow down your search.
- Do the same search multiple times using different key words.
- 3) Look at many different websites.
- 4) Keep your searches simple.
- 5) Look at all of the pages of a website
- 6) Keep in mind:
 - a. Relevancy does this have anything to do with what I need?
 - b. **Accuracy** is this information correct?
 - c. Point of view who is telling me this information? Can I trust them?
 - d. **Opinion vs. fact** is this someone's opinion, or is it a fact?
 - e. Up to Date Is this information current, or outdated?
